Bullock presents proposed budget

County Judge John Bullock pre-sented his proposed budget for the upcoming fiscal year to the Young County Commissioners Court

Monday. Notable changes from the previ-

ous budget include a complete zeroing out of the indigent health care budget. With the creation of the Graham Hospital District and the existence of the Olney Hospital District, Young County is effectively relieved of the responsibility, according to Bullock. Last year, \$160,380 was budgeted for indigent health care, and, of that amount, \$44,146 has been spent to-date. ous budget include a complete

Bullock also noted an estimated 5 percent increase in anticipated insurance fixed costs and an increase in the medical portion of the premium.

budget also calls for the reestablishment of the county elec-tions administrator and states that "there will be no effect on the county clerk's budget or the tax assessor/ collector's budget because they are budgeted separate and apart from the respective offices they are

assigned to." Bullock's budget raises more total property taxthan last year's budget by \$137,028 or 2.4 percent of the \$11.9 million budget.

But with \$20 million in added

But with \$20 million in added property value within the county, the proposed tax rate is lowered from the current year's 65.5 cents per \$100 of valuation to 59.2 cents. Bullock's budget reflects annual salary increases of \$1,970 for the two constables and a \$2,517 increase for the county autorney who also will receive a raise from the state supplement in the amount of \$3,750 to \$5,000 this year. After the judge presented his budget, Dayne Miller, county attorney, was the first to speak, requesting was the first to speak, requesting

Request to repair, use old jail generates discussion

A item in the county judge's pro-posed budget garnered a great deal of discussion among the Young County Commissioner's Court

Judge John Bullock has proposed \$177,000 toward repair and use of the old jail building at 502 Second

the old jail building at 302 Second St.

"I want to repurpose the law enforcement center," Bullock said. "I think, with minimum modifications, we could alleviate storage problems. The cells would work well for an archive-type facility."

He added that with the district and county courts operating at a good

county courts operating at a good pace, the adult probation case load is growing and the department has outgrown its available office space. and.

"Something needs to be done, and it is a substantial structure," Bull ock said. "I have two professionals

that gave the opinion it's not wise to destroy the structure. It's being used for randomly storing records now. The cost of what repairs need to be made would be minimal and very efficient. This is the third time I've suggested it."

Of the proposed \$177,000 bud-geted, \$160,000 would be used for epairs with the bulk of that going

repairs with the bulk of that going to repair the roof.
Precinct 4 Commissioner Jimmy Wiley said two architects told him it would cost a minimum of \$500,000 to get the building in shape. "Ihave a problem in that this court said it wasn't deemed sufficient so the new facility was built," Wiley said.

"It was deemed unfit as a jail. "It was problematic in the area of confinement," Bullock said. "But as a dry storage, I think it should be managed, instead of just watched
